- Nationalism



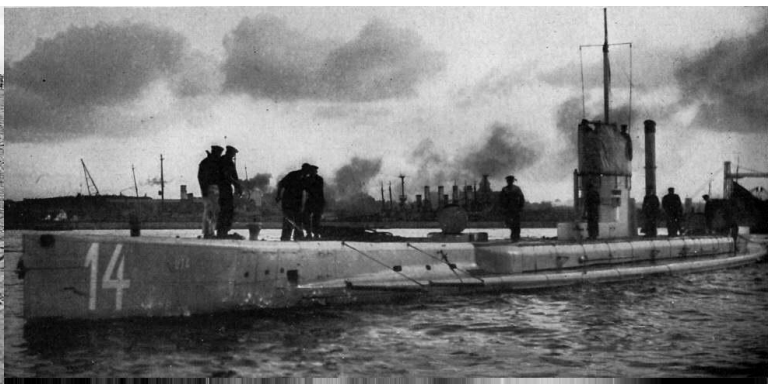
### **Unit 3: Conflict**

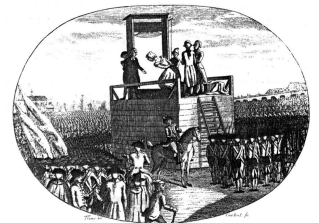


## Classroom Expectations:
